

EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY

East Carolina University is the third largest of six constituent institutions of the University of North Carolina. Enrollment, as of 2017, stands at nearly 29,000. The university has ten professional schools with a 18:1 student-to-faculty ratio. The university is located within a two-hour drive of both the state capital in Raleigh and the Atlantic Coast beaches.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Graduate assistantships are sometimes available for full-time students. Assistantships will usually be in the Department of Political Science, but sometimes can be located in other academic units. Also, the Federal Work Study Program is now open to Graduate students. This program can help finance one's education and does not require repayment. If you qualify for this program, you can be employed by the department in a graduate assistant-like capacity. ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The Master of Science in Security Studies program provides students an interdisciplinary approach to understanding and addressing the diverse domestic and international challenges to U.S. security. These threats may be posed by natural disasters or by man, whether through governments or non-state actors such as terrorist groups. The program is designed to enable students to evaluate situations and develop responses at the international, national, state, and local levels.

Students may choose to bypass the thesis option by taking two additional courses (6 credits) in their Area of Emphasis. Students selecting the thesis option must complete a minimum of 6 credits of **SECS 7000 Thesis coursework. Students pursuing the Area of Emphasis in Science and Technology Security, Computer Science Specialization must combine **SECS 7000** Thesis (3 credits) with **CSCI 7000** Thesis (3 credits) for the total of 6 credits of thesis.

Students must complete the above required course work plus one area of emphasis. All students must also pass a comprehensive exam.

BASIC GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- Minimum of 36 hours including the Core Courses and Area of Emphasis.
- Students should maintain a B average and shall not receive a final grade of C or less in courses totaling in excess of 6 hours.
- Thesis or non-thesis option completion.
- Successfully pass a comprehensive exam.
- Coursework must be completed within six years. Extensions may be applied for with the Director of SECS and ECU Graduate School.

AREAS OF EMPHASIS REQUIREMENTS

Students must choose one Area of Emphasis and take 12 credits in that Area.

All courses are 3 credits, unless otherwise noted. Some courses may have prerequisites which students must first satisfy. If students have not completed such prerequisites as part of their previous studies, the actual number of credit hours needed for their Area of Emphasis may exceed 12, resulting in the student having to take more than the minimum 36 credits.

Students should be aware that not all Areas of Emphasis or courses in them are available via Distance Education.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

A student who specializes in security studies acquires the skills in writing, communications, and analysis that are critical to working in a career field related to national security. Students may work for any one of the 22 federal agencies that comprise the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of Defense, other federal departments or any of the national intelligence agencies that support the homeland security mission. At the state and local levels, students may work in law enforcement, health, environment, transportation, critical infrastructure protection or any number of jobs related to security.
