
We do this through:



A student who specializes in security studies acquires the skills in writing, communication, and analysis that are critical to working in a career field related to homeland or national security. Students may work for any one of the 22 federal agencies that comprise the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of Defense, other federal departments or any of the national intelligence agencies that support the homeland security mission. At the state and local levels, students may work in law enforcement, health, environment, transportation, critical infrastructure protection or any number of jobs related to security.

The curriculum is grounded in the knowledge, skills, and abilities related to security career fields that are in demand in today's competitive marketplace.

MILITARY STUDENT OPTIONS

Our program is dedicated to assisting military students in their pursuit of higher education goals. Our Distance Education opportunities facilitate participation in Security Studies courses for both active duty and reserve military personnel.
